We Remember Friends

Henry Marshall Passmore died January 22 in San Antonio, Texas at the age of 83. He moved to Texas several years ago to live with his daughter, Diane Pina. In 2005 he moved to the Morningside Manor when he needed more care. Henry was a graduate of George School and Oberlin College. He taught at the Oakwood School in Poughkeepsie, New York for several years before working for the United Fund in Massachusetts and Pennsylvania. He later joined the AFSC to direct their international programs. At Media Meeting he was active with the CASA Committee. He is survived by three children: Mary P. Karp of White Plains, New York, Diane P. Pina of San Antonio, Texas, and Samuel B. Passmore of Ann Arbor, Michigan. Henry also leaves five grandchildren, four step-grandchildren and his former wife Barbara, who now resides in Seattle, Washington. A meditation was held in San Antonio. Charles William Beehler died January 24. He was 78. Chuck grew up in Tobyanna, Pennsylvania, graduated from Penn State and received his graduate degrees from the University of Pennsylvania. He taught science in the

Rose Tree Media (RTM) School District and was a science supervisor for 35 years. He also conducted science workshops for other school districts. After he retired from RTM, he joined Widener University where he helped create a science teaching center which is still active today. At Media Meeting he served as clerk and on the MPFS board, and taught First-Day school classes. Chuck enjoyed gardening, camping, bird watching and being with the family, especially his young granddaughter. He was a caring, thoughtful person, a great mentor to young people, and an educator for 41 years. He is survived by Eve, his wife of 48 years, his son, Carl Beehler of Media, a daughter, Diane Beehler-Ostapchenko of Wilmington, Delaware, a granddaughter, Anna Ostapchenko, a brother and two sisters. Clifford Akeley Woodbury, Jr. died January 31 at nearly 93 years of age. He was a graduate of Westtown School and attended Harvard University. He was first employed at Scott Paper, and then at the Provident Mutual Life Insurance

Company as a supervisor. His lifelong interest in music began as a child when he sang duets with his mother and studied the violin. At Westtown he was a soloist in the school's musical productions. At Harvard he sang with the Harvard Chapel Choir. Clifford also performed on the Major Bowes Hour and with the New York Singing Teachers Association. He was a bass soloist for several churches and gave concerts in this area. In 1949 he sang at Carnegie Hall. His hobby was maintaining and showing his collection of antique Cadillac cars, occasionally driving one of them in a parade. His wife of 67 years, Ethel Coppock Woodbury, died in 2006. Clifford is survived by three children: Judith W. Ashelman of China, Elissa W. Gifford of Maine, and Clifford A. Woodbury III of Media. He also has eight grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. A memorial service was held March 10 at Media Meeting.

Business Meeting Highlights

Media Meeting January 2007

NOTE: The paragraph below, from Media Meeting's January 2007 minutes, was inadvertently omitted from last month's newsletter. The editors are most apologetic and are taking the liberty of printing it below in its entirety.

Karen Reichardt reported on the joint Religious Education Committee meeting which reviewed ideas for improving attendance at First-Day school. One proposal was to hold classes at 11:00 A.M.; another was to have separate classes at each Meeting to avoid the commuting which some people find difficult. The Committee proposed that separate classes for children be held at each Meeting for a trial period of four months beginning in February after which time the trial will be evaluated. The adult class will decide at its next meeting what schedule it will follow. If children's classes are held at 11:00 A.M. we will need more teachers as some teachers want to be able to attend meeting for worship. We will also need to decide when, or whether, the children will attend meeting for worship.

The recording clerk reported that in 2006 Media Meeting had a net increase of five members resulting from 10 applications for membership, three members' deaths and two releases of associate members who reached the age of 21. The Meeting's membership now totals 171 with 138 adults, 16 minors and 17 associates.

At Quarterly Meeting, Swarthmore Meeting gave a presentation on community-supported agriculture and energy-saving lighting. The treasurer, Lyle Jenks, reported that at the half-way point of the current fiscal year we are "where we want to be." The Quarter approved a minute from Swarthmore Meeting reinforcing the Peace Tax Fund and sending the minute on to Yearly Meeting. Monthly meetings were urged to pass their own minutes, using this as an opportunity to contact members of Congress. A question was raised on whether our monthly meeting needs to re-approve a minute in support of the Religious Freedom Tax Bill. The Meeting approved sending this to the Peace and Social Justice Committee to review any changes in the legislation and bring it back to March's business meeting.

The Religious Education Committee had a very productive meeting on January 17 to discuss how Media would handle the four-month experiment requested by Providence that First-Day school be held separately by each Meeting. Information was gathered from Meeting members and attenders who have children in order to understand the parents' and children's needs and desires for the First-Day school program. It was clear that the needs and interests are varied. It was reaffirmed that

many of our teachers wanted and needed to be in meeting for worship although there were some who volunteered to teach occasionally during that time. It was also affirmed that the childcare time during meeting for worship is a valuable and enjoyable time for our children. "It is a lesson in community." It was decided that we will continue to have First-Day school before meeting for worship. The morning schedule, on non-business meeting days will be as follows: 9:30–9:50 A.M. — singing, optional; 9:50–10:45 A.M. — First-Day classes.

The biggest change is on First Days with business meeting. There will now be a lesson given during the childcare time. This will be optional for the children but will hopefully reach children who might not be attending First-Day school and perhaps encourage their interest in participating in the future. The committee looked at other calendar issues including special activities. Wax egg decorating will be held at Media on March 18, 2007. Providence will be invited to join us. There will also be First-Day school at Media on Quarterly and Yearly Meeting First Days.

There will be a joint meeting of the Media and Providence Religious Education Committees on April 23 to evaluate the new arrangement. With the new arrangement there is an immediate need for storage space for the First-Day school curricula, supplies, books, equipment, etc. The Meeting approved having the Property Committee address this concern with MPFS for secured, adequate and accessible space for the needs of the Religious Education Committee. Adult education, which is under the care of Worship and Ministry, will continue with extracts on Quaker belief from *Faith and Practice*. The class will begin at 9:50 A.M. at Media Meeting with Providence Meeting members most welcome to join us.

The Property Committee provided detailed cost breakdowns for the capital improvements including energy efficient windows and roof replacement. The total cost is \$213,000. This includes one-third of the total \$70,000 for the roof work. The other two-thirds are to come from the Meeting's reserves and from a \$20,000 grant from PYM. The clerk asked the Meeting to approve a capital campaign total of \$275,000. This would include the funds expected to come from the reserves and PYM. It also includes a 20% contingency allocation. It does not include the already approved amplification system that would cost about \$10,000 although that cost could be factored in to the overall \$275,000 amount. A concern was raised that these funds are to be raised over a 3-5 year time period and that during that time other expenses may be incurred by the Meeting for building improvements. It is understood that the funds approved are for items already approved and reviewed by the Meeting and the Property Committee. A

concern was also raised that the current budget includes 35% of the total allocated to our covenant with PYM and that we are now asking members to give to a capital campaign fund. The Finance Committee will look at this concern and other large budget items. **The Meeting approved \$275,000 for the amount of the capital campaign.**

There was an extended discussion about the various needs for space by different groups for different purposes in light of MPFS' recent request for support from the Meeting to proceed with a grant application for improvements to the social room. The clerk of the Property Committee was instructed to contact the clerks of each standing committee in order to determine their space needs more fully. This information is to be brought back to a future business meeting. The Meeting can then pass this information, and any decisions made, to the ad hoc Meeting/School Relations Committee to take to the school. **The Meeting APPROVED having the clerk of the Property Committee address the immediate needs of the Religious Education Committee for adequate, accessible and secure storage space for First-Day school materials with the school.** The Meeting APPROVED the formation of an ad hoc Meeting/School Relations Committee. The convener will be Marc Harrison. Members are Althea Whyte, Bob Williamson, George Forsythe, Janet Nicholson, Marcelle Banks-Blair, Susan Garrison and Karen Reichardt with Will Scull serving as an advisor.

A report on Interim Meeting noted that Arthur Larrabee is the new General Secretary of PYM. All three final candidates were very strong and all would have done an excellent job. It was determined that Arthur was the best fit for PYM's needs at this time. PYM costs more than it is bringing in and must continue to look at how to handle this budget shortfall. PYM continues to need the support of the General Fund as half of its \$52 million in assets are restricted and not readily available. Changing this would require an expensive legal process involving the courts. There will be a March session of the Financial Organization Group to look at the consolidation of PYM's grant-making process. A Meeting member wondered why there is a necessity to make Arch Street profitable. It is an important part of our Yearly Meeting outreach and an important gathering place. "How do you put a price on the experience of this building?"

The PYM Peace and Social Concerns Committee supports Endow-A-Home, an organization that works to end homelessness one house at a time. Its focus is on women with children and it aids in training these women to be able to live productive and fulfilling lives in the Philadelphia community. Donations of money or household items are welcome.

Reports from Althea Whyte on CASA, Candace Davis on Deepening and Strengthening, and Garrett Forsythe on Treasury were postponed until the next business meeting.

The clerk shared membership statistics as of December 31, 2006. There were 190 total members—155 adults, 28 minors, and 7 associates. The addition of three new members balanced out a similar number of losses, one due to death and two to transfers out.

The treasurer noted that we have received about 55% of the contributions we need to balance the budget; we are at 52% of our expenditures for the fiscal year. We have completed 58% of the fiscal year.

The proposed Religious Education schedule was reported as follows: 11:00 A.M.—Children and adults begin meeting for worship together; 11:20 A.M.–12:15 P.M.—Children and teachers attend class. Children will then be escorted by their teachers to meet their parents/guardians. If meeting is completed prior to 12:15 P.M., parents should plan to pick up their children at that time. Childcare will be in place for children up to 5 years of age starting at 11:00 A.M. Children aged 13 and up are invited to participate in Young Friends off-campus activities held at various times during the month. Young Friends are welcome to attend meeting for worship. Adult classes open to both Providence and Media Meetings will be conducted at Media and we will post the topics of these as soon as possible. Providence Meeting will occasionally conduct an adult class or event at the same time as this class but we hope adults at Providence will participate in the adult programs at Media Meeting. It was made clear that we will need more adult support for teaching. The fact that children will be leaving meeting at 11:20 A.M. means that adults are encouraged to enter meeting on time or wait to enter until the children leave for their classes. There will be First-Day school every First Day, even on days when business meeting occurs. It is possible that First-Day school will continue during the summer. The adults responsible for curriculum will meet to plan and review curriculum and will report on the topics to Meg Barney. Meg will present a general curriculum description at the March business meeting. Joint meeting was discussed in the context of intergenerational events; the Committee will discuss this and Meg will work with the First-Day school clerk at Media to plan some of these. The next intergenerational event will be the wax egg-making event on March 18 at 9:30 A.M. at Media. The Program and Outreach Committees of each Meeting are working together to plan other joint events. Meg Barney will bring regular updates and a review of the current set-up to business meeting. The review process includes a meeting with Media Meeting to examine the results and impact of the parallel programs. At that time future steps will be considered. This proposal was APPROVED.

Friends APPROVED a minute of appreciation for the work Meg Barney has done to facilitate this discussion and

change. Friends APPROVED a minute of gratitude to Medard Gabel for his work being the sole faculty representative from Providence Meeting this past year during First-Day school. We also acknowledged the role of Judy Fowler in helping to craft and explain this new First-Day school program. Friends will be notified of the changes via the phone tree and a change will be made in our Friends Journal ad and the sign in front of the meetinghouse.

The clerk reported that, as a result of the letter we sent to the PYM Financial Stewardship Committee, he was contacted by that Committee's clerk to arrange a discussion. A working group, comprised of Maggie Juliano, Lynn Oberfield, Phil Peterson and John Shaw, will convene to prepare for that meeting. Joe Elliott will act as a resource person for the group.

Sam Caldwell shared his first draft of a bequests brochure that the Meeting requested. Sam encouraged us to think about helping to secure the future of the Meeting by increasing the endowment through a bequest. The brochure includes possible language for such a bequest. Since bequests play a critical role in allowing the Meeting to manage its long-term needs, Friends who decide to leave bequests are asked to let the clerk of either the Meeting or the Trustees know, as well as the treasurer. Typically, institutions create a Bequest Society composed of these individuals; members would be listed (with an option to remain anonymous). It was stressed that confidentiality may be important to many who plan to make a bequest and that such confidentiality would be strictly maintained for those who desire it. Friends are invited to share their thoughts and ideas with Sam as wording for a minute for approval is created to be brought forward in March. The draft of the brochure will be circulated this month prior to the formal minute presentation.

The Landscape Committee reported that the foundation planting process has begun with preparation of space for new plantings, soil testing and management of the water around the foundation. The pruning of the yews was also accomplished. Some of the work to be done next year includes ongoing maintenance of plantings and the creation of a plan for future composting. The Landscape Committee agreed to post their minutes on the bulletin board as well as before and after pictures of their projects.

The Communications Committee reported that the current website should be understood to be a work in progress. Friends are encouraged to visit www.providencemeeting.org. The Committee welcomes new ideas from users of the site as it plans to edit the site's current language. We will also be asking Young Friends for their ideas about how to make the website more engaging. To keep the website up to date committee members have agreed to take turns managing the site each month. To date, Mary Gabel has been our web keeper. Links to

MPFS, Media Meeting and other Quaker organizations listed in our directory will be added to our website.

The Rotary Club has gained all the permissions necessary to work on the Sandy Bank Cemetery and will soon be ready to start the clean-up there. Friends should be ready to answer the call from the Rotary Club for assistance in the near future.

The Oral History Project Working Group of Providence Friends Meeting continues its work. Currently the group is organizing a birthday celebration for 10 (!) of our members who are 85 years of age or older. Hold Sunday, April 15, 2007 at 12:30 P.M. for this grand event!
